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#### **Statistics**

We have conducted **325** evaluations for **282** clients from **59** countries.

We have trained **504** medical students to evaluate clients for signs of physical and psychological trauma.

92% of cases that have gone to court have been granted asylum or another form of protection with the help of WCCHR students and evaluators.
